Despite various efforts by governments, nonprofits, and community organizations, the challenge persists, demanding innovative approaches for meaningful change (Doe et al., 2019). In today's society, the issue of homelessness is a complex and multifaceted challenge that affects individuals, families, and communities worldwide (Chatterjee & Banerjee, 2019). Despite various efforts to address it, homelessness persists as a persistent social issue with far-reaching implications. To comprehend the depth of this phenomenon, it is imperative to delve into its multifaceted nature, exploring its causes, manifestations, and potential solutions. Homelessness is not a singular problem with a one-size-fits-all solution (Culhane et al., 2011; Chatterjee & Banerjee, 2019). Instead, it is a multifarious predicament, born from a confluence of factors encompassing economic hardship (Narayan & Petesch, 2002), mental health afflictions, systemic barriers, and a lack of affordable housing, among others.

The study on "Homelessness: Reaching Out to the Community" holds profound significance in contemporary society, given the escalating challenges associated with homelessness. This research aims to explore and address the multifaceted dimensions of homelessness, emphasizing the imperative need for community engagement and outreach programs. The urgency of this study is underscored by the pervasive nature of homelessness, impacting individuals and families across diverse demographic and socioeconomic spectra. Homelessness represents a stark manifestation of societal inequalities, economic disparities, and systemic failures (Raju & Kallur, 2018). This study sets the stage for an in-depth exploration of homelessness, examining its underlying causes, the diverse demographics it impacts, the challenges faced by those experiencing homelessness, and the ongoing efforts aimed at alleviating this societal issue. By understanding the complexities of homelessness, societies can work towards fostering empathy, implementing effective policies, and ultimately creating a more inclusive society where everyone has access to stable housing and a sense of belonging (Chatterjee & Banerjee, 2019).

## II. LITERATURE REVIEW

To support the assertions made in this exploration, a comprehensive review of existing literature and research studies is required (Kumar, 2023), which has been done focusing on homelessness and community engagement. Notable studies such as "The Role of Community Partnerships in Addressing Homelessness" (Smith et al., 2018; Mishra, 2013) and "Community-Driven Approaches to Homelessness Prevention" (Jones, 2020) offer valuable insights into effective strategies for collaboration between various stakeholders.

Homelessness is a pervasive societal issue with profound implications for individuals and communities (Doe et al., 2019). This literature review critically examines the intersection of homelessness and community engagement, seeking to uncover effective strategies for addressing this complex problem. As societies grapple with the multifaceted challenges of homelessness, the role of community outreach becomes increasingly pivotal (Dubey & Patel, 2015). This literature review focuses on projects and initiatives that involve "reaching out" to the homeless population through community-based interventions (Mishra, 2013). Beyond the individual, homelessness casts a wide net of consequences affecting communities. Research



underscores the severe impact on mental and physical health, education, and employment opportunities for those experiencing homelessness. Lahiri-Dutt and Samanta (2005) highlight the role of informal settlements and the strategies employed by marginalized communities to secure housing, often through informal and semi-legal means. The marginalized communities are more prone to look for such settlements. The urban poor also face challenges in gaining access to land and housing in small towns in West Bengal, India.

Community outreach programs are also helpful in supporting such causes (Smith et al., 2018; Jones, 2020). It refers to a range of actions that connect individuals or organizations with resources and support within their local environment. The primary data was collected from old age homes and different trusts. Below are the following organizations from where the data was collected:

**A) Sri Udaya Old Age Home:**

Situated in Virgo Nagar Post, Bangalore, stands as a beacon of exemplary care for the elderly. This institution, known for its commendable services, caters to the needs of senior citizens who, due to various reasons, find themselves away from their homes. Managed with dedication by either governmental or nongovernmental organizations, this home ensures the provision of fundamental care and essential facilities. Residents are guaranteed nutritious meals, hygienic surroundings, and round-the-clock emergency medical assistance facilitated by registered nurses. Beyond the essentials, Sri Udaya fosters a vibrant community by organizing activities and social engagements to combat loneliness and provide a fulfilling living experience for its elderly residents. The home's reputation as one of the best reflects its commitment to compassionate care, dedicated staff, and maintaining a high standard of living, making it a trusted haven for the elderly in their fragile phase of life.

**B) The Gnana Jyothi Trust:**

Established in 2016 and registered as a society in 2007, has been a vital force in providing essential support to those in need. Situated in Garden City College Main Road, Kithaganur, Bidarahalli Hobli, near Anuma Temple in Bangalore, this trust has grown substantially, now accommodating over 60 individuals in a spacious building equipped with all necessary amenities. The mission of the Gnana Jyothi Trust is commendable, focusing on the fundamental aspects of food and shelter. They ensure that no one in their care goes hungry or is without a safe home. The provision of breakfast, lunch, and dinner, along with beverages and snacks, serves as immediate assistance. Additionally, the trust is committed to providing long-term stability by collaborating with communities to offer sustainable solutions.

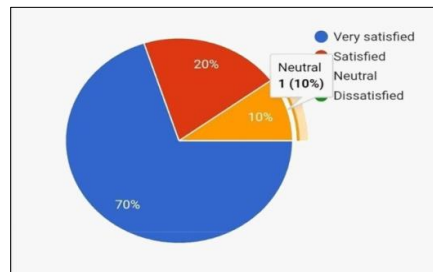
**C) Garden City Jeevitha Anathashrama:**

Since its inception in 2003, Garden City Jeevitha Anathashrama has been dedicated to realizing children's dreams, firmly believing that every child deserves equal rights and opportunities, regardless of their place of birth. The organization focuses on addressing the profound challenges faced by children from migratory families, who often encounter the dire consequences of poverty, illiteracy, and homelessness. These families struggle to provide even the most basic care, nutrition, and education for their children. Garden City Jeevitha Anathashrama has witnessed firsthand the despair of parents rendered helpless by their circumstances, some resorting to severe measures. In contrast, others turn abusive, leaving their children in environments devoid of safety and security. Through its dedicated efforts, the organization has completed over 250 campaigns and currently manages 29 ongoing campaigns, driven by the commitment of more than 50 young volunteers.

The study aimed to find out the facilities and experiences of the people staying at old age homes. It was done using a survey questionnaire. Three old age homes were visited, and the responses were collected from 65 inhabitants. The study also used an unstructured interview method to know their experiences. The results have been presented in the form of pie charts and percentages.

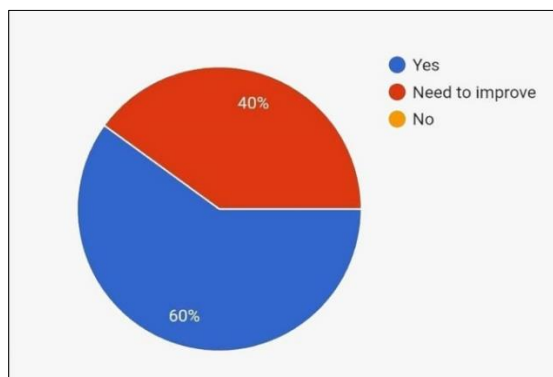
### III. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

The survey among the residents of old age homes or NGOs reveals (fig 3.1) that most of them are satisfied with the services offered (70%). However, 20% of the respondents were unhappy with the overall care and support quality.



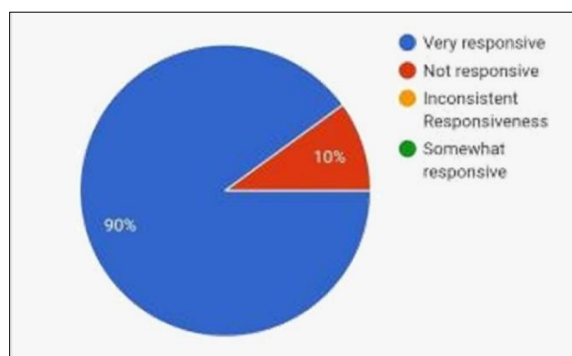
**Figure 1: Overall Care and Support Quality**

Sixty percentages of the respondents feel that the facilities offered in these homes are meeting their expectations. At the same time, a considerable percentage (40%) of them believes that the facilities can be improved further.



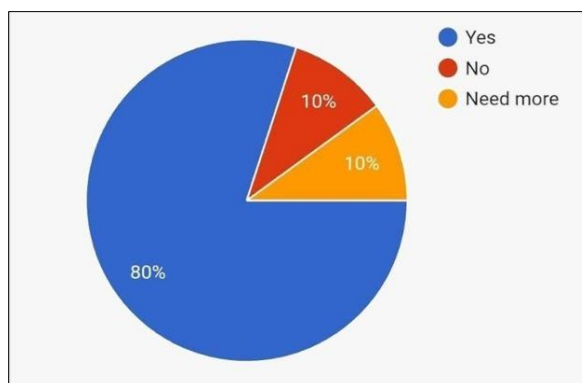
**Figure 2: Facilities Meeting the Expectations**

The residents (90%) are found to be happy with the response of the staff members employed in the old age homes. A few of them (10%) are unhappy with the staff members' response.



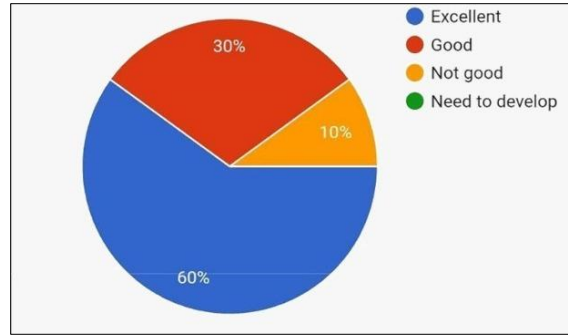
**Figure 3: Response of the Staff Members**

It is evident from Fig 3.4 that when asked about the presence of recreational and social activities, the residents (80%) said that they have a good number of activities to engage in, although they want some more variety. A few respondents (10%) felt that there was not much activity to be engaged in.



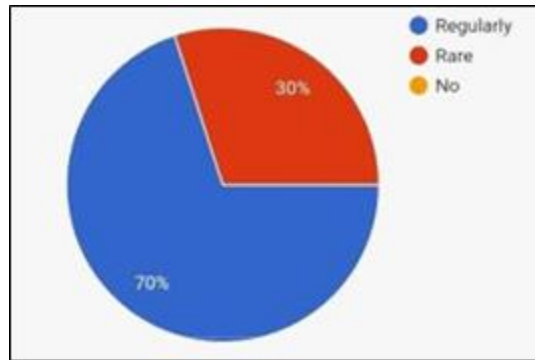
**Figure 4: Recreational and Social Activity**

Fig 3.5 reveals that a good number of residents (60%) expressed their satisfaction with healthcare services available in old age homes, while a few (10%) are not happy with the services being offered. The nature of healthcare facilities varies much across the different old age homes. It also depends upon their fund allocation.

When asked about the sense of companionship (Fig 3.6), most of the respondents are happy (70%) with it, but a considerable number of respondents do not find such an opportunity for them. Thirty percentages of the respondents miss the companionship at these old age homes. It may be a big challenge for the management to engage the residents in such a way that they feel valued and get good company.

By reaching out to those in need through outreach teams, shelters, or community organizations, society demonstrates its solidarity with the most vulnerable members and its dedication to upholding human rights for all. Furthermore, homeless reaching out extends beyond immediate interventions to encompass long-term solutions to address the root causes of homelessness. In this regard, old age homes can adopt online methods for marketing, promotion, and sourcing for funds (Kumar, Kumar, & Mishra, 2015). This may involve advocating for affordable housing policies, expanding access to social services, promoting economic opportunities, and challenging discriminatory practices perpetuating homelessness.
